“for I was hungry and you gave Me food, I was thirsty and you gave Me drink,... I was naked and you clothed Me, I was sick and you visited Me” (Mt. 25: 35a, 35b, 36a, 36b; RSV), “When you did it to these My brothers you were doing it to Me!” (Mt. 25: 40b; The Living Bible).

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“And they were bringing children to Him that He might touch them; and the disciples rebuked them. But when Jesus saw it He was indignant, and said to them, “Let the children come to Me, do not hinder them; for to such belong the kingdom of God. Truly, I say to you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God like a child shall not enter it. And He took them in His arms and blessed them, laying His hands upon them” (Mk. 10: 13 - 16; RSV).

As we enter the text Jesus is on His way to Jerusalem to die a most horrific death upon the cross. Though Scripture does not record why the children are being brought to Jesus, there are two possible explanations. First, it was the custom of the time for mother's to bring their children to a distinguished Rabbi that he might bless them on their first birthday. Second, it might be that Jesus reputation as a miracle worker preceded Him. Consequently, it could be argued that children were being brought to Jesus so that He might touch them as a way to protect them against the ravages infant mortality, which ran as high as 30 percent of those who survived to the age of six and 60 percent by the age of sixteen. However, I do not believe either of these reasons is in tension with the other. Rather, the common belief expressed by both is the same, namely, that faith in Jesus will bless and/or protect the children brought before Him who are most vulnerable to the trauma and tumult of disease, famine, war as well as the threat of evil ever present at the time.

Whatever the reason we notice the disciples acting as if they were bodyguards, hustling the children out of Jesus' way. They are in fact enforcing the standard social mores of the time in which children should not disturb teachers or students. Yet, when Jesus saw this rather than congratulate them, “He became angry” (Mk. 10: 14a; GNT) with the disciples. Notice that, in a rather nuanced statement, Jesus does **NOT** say, “Bring the children to Me,” but “Let the children come to Me,” (Mk. 10: 14a; RSV), by which He simultaneously illustrates God's kindness and the disciples lack of understanding the point of Jesus ministry.

We need remember that at no time in Scripture does Jesus turn away from anyone, the example of which is no better reflected then in this passage. Contrary to what the disciples appear to believe, Jesus' ministry is not exclusive, but inclusive. Put another way, God loves each of us individually and Jesus illustrates this with His focus on the children, who in a very real sense are prototypical of the weak, defenseless and the exposed. Understood within this framework, Jesus' declarations that the reign of God belongs to children and

“whoever does not receive the kingdom of God like a child shall not enter it” (Mk. 10: 14 – 15; RSV), are revolutionary. For, in the culture of the time, children are not considered as persons. As such, they have neither status nor power. Contrary to this accepted belief, Jesus insists that God’s rule extends to the lowly, the dispossessed and the marginalized.

I believe He does this not only because of God’s love for His creation, but because within each child is housed great promise and potential; traits which can be used to bring into the church fresh perspectives and new ideas. For when we of an older age and generation are no longer able to perform the tasks and responsibilities associated with faith and religious leadership, governance and administration, it is the children who will be our heirs, our successors who will preserve the church and proclaim the Good News. They are, as has often been said, the future of the church; not to be relegated to the margins, but brought to the forefront.

It is for this reason that I consider it so vitally important to expose our children to our Christian heritage and to our reformed tradition. Once again, I have been blessed with a superior group of students which include Rachel Gendreau, Elizabeth Kita, Logan Muska and Juan O’Brien. I thank them for their attentiveness, for the many times of laughter, the camaraderie we have shared and how they have always respected one another and cared for one another. Similarly, I would like to thank my co-instructor Anne Stucklen, a woman of great faith and intelligence who always brings her love of God and of the students into the classroom.

During our time together they have read and studied the Old Testament books of Genesis and Exodus as well as the Gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke in the New Testament. Additionally, they have seen a film on the Gospel of John and did a comprehensive study on the book of Acts. In like manner, we have gone on field trips to St. John’s Episcopal Church; St. Philips Roman Catholic Church; Calvary Lutheran Church; Broad Brook Congregational Church; Wesley Methodist Church; St. Panteleimon Russian Orthodox Church; and most recently, Temple Beth Israel. As we end our formal time together the class is preparing for their oral exam in front of the congregation on April 17th; their faith paper on April 24th; and their final field trip, this time to attend a worship service at the Jonathan Edwards Church in Northampton, Massachusetts, also on Sunday, April 24th.

Upon graduation, which will take place on Sunday, May 22nd, the Confirmation Class promises to be faithful members of the Church of Jesus Christ and to bring forth Christ's presence in the world. Most recently we have witnessed a dramatic example of this covenant of faith put into action from one of our former confirmands, Renee Leighton. Following in the footsteps of her sister, Sabrina, Renee works as a waitress at Shady Glen Restaurant in Manchester. It is common knowledge the hourly wage of a waitress or waiter is offset by the tips they garner during a given shift. Consequently, as the Bible so aptly reminds us, there are times of plenty and times of want. Still, Renee, like Sabrina before her, gathered her earnings and with no assistance contributed the \$100.00 needed to heat the sanctuary and the Parish Hall for our Sunday service. I know your earnings do not come easily. So I am all the more impressed with your generosity and the example of faith you have provided. Thank you. I am so very proud of both of you.

As I conclude this article I do so with a heavy heart, for it is my sad duty to announce the passing of Jackie Lowry (Saturday, June 4, 1927 – Friday, April 8, 2016). I will always remember Jackie as a kind, caring, and loving soul. She loved to laugh, which we both did often when we were together, and when she did her face would brighten and her eyes would twinkle. She possessed what I can only describe as a certain dignity. I remember going over her house for lunch with members of the Food Pantry and how she took great care in making sure everything was perfect. Perhaps it was a product of the many parties in which she was involved over the years or perhaps it was just part of a proper sense of decorum that we have lost in this age; regardless, she was the consummate hostess.

Yet, for all her adventures, for all the traveling she had done over the years, for the gifts she possessed in her art and in her upholstering, which in many others causes them to act superior or conceited, I never, ever found her to be aloof, quite the opposite, I found her to be quite humble. The First Letter of Peter records, "Clothe yourselves, all of you, with humility toward one another, for "God opposes the proud, but gives grace to the humble. Humble yourselves therefore under the mighty hand of God, that in due time He may exalt you. Cast all your anxieties on Him, for He cares about you" (I Peter 5: 5 - 6; RSV).

Jackie possessed this grace, the grace to be humble, the grace given from God. She was a very faithful woman who sincerely loved and trusted in the Lord—and she did cast her anxieties on Him, knowing He would shoulder the burden. Now she has made her final journey to that Kingdom which has no end—and she will be missed.

In addition to her family I would also ask that you keep her good friend Jean Blanchard in your prayers. Jackie would often tell me that Jean was her angel who, no matter how bad things got, could always make her laugh. “All’s we do is laugh,” she would say. “With this darn cancer sometimes I just don’t feel like doing things but Jean won’t let me feel sorry for myself, she can be like a drill sergeant because she tells me ‘Now Jackie, you’re going to have rest or you’re going to have to have something to eat’. She keeps me on the straight and narrow and tells me to pick myself up buy my own bootstraps—and she’s right. I don’t know what I’d do without Jean.”

While Jean is too humble to take credit, I would thank her for the example of faith and unselfish love she has provided. For in taking care of Jackie as she did, she followed the words of Christ most perfectly as when He said, “for I was hungry and you gave Me food, I was thirsty and you gave Me drink,...I was naked and you clothed Me, I was sick and you visited Me” (Mt. 25: 35a, 35b, 36a, 36b; RSV), “When you did it to these My brothers you were doing it to Me!” (Mt. 25: 40b; The Living Bible).

Whether it is early in our walk of faith or in our much later years we, as Christians, are directed by Christ Himself who says, “I give you a new command. Love one another. You must love each other as I have loved you. All people will know that you are My followers if you love each other” (John 13: 34 – 35; NCV).

Lord give us the strength to follow Your command. This we pray in Jesus Name. AMEN.
